Free School Meal Eligibility—Have your circumstances changed?

If you think you might be entitled to free school meals please get in touch with our office staff urgently. We can check your eligibility quickly with just your name and National Insurance Number. You may be eligible for free school meals if you are now eligible for any of the following:

- Income Support
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- the guaranteed element of Pension Credit

• Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)

• Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get).

During the outbreak the government are also temporarily extending free school meal eligibility to include some groups (subject to household income) that have no recourse to public funds, including:

- children of Zambrano carers
- children of families with no recourse to public funds with a right to remain in the UK on grounds of private and family life under Article 8 of the European Convention on Human Rights
- children of families receiving support under Section 17 of the Children Act 1989 **who are also** subject to a no recourse to public funds restriction

• children of a subset of failed asylum seekers supported under Section 4 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.

If you think you might be eligible for free school meals please contact the school immediately. It is easy for us to check and we will be able to get vouchers to you if your child is at home during the school closure. Furthermore the school will receive additional funding to further support your child's education which can be used to support extra curricular activities, trips etc too.

Support from school and church

If you, or your child, are finding life a bit of a struggle at the moment and need some extra support please do get in touch with us. Our Home School Link Worker and ELSA support is still available by phone and we have had many parents and staff volunteer to reach out to anyone in need and offer any support they can. The staff teams at our local churches are also very happy to offer pastoral support. So whether you need something practical or just to have a chat with someone do please let us know. We will be really happy to help.

I did have one thought. Do you think that if you give some real-life examples, it would help the MP's understand even more by showing then what is happening in the world right NOW and why it's so important to act now instead of talking for more years?

For example, Sahena Begum, who is just 26 years old and lives in Bangladesh has had to move her family (including young children) nine times to avoid floods. Now I know there are always floods there, but climate change has made these floods bigger and less predictable.

As a result of this it's harder to collect water and farmers haven't been able to grow as many crops meaning prices have had to go up. Families can't get clean water or afford food meaning they get sick and at worst die of starvation.

She's trying to adapt to climate change. She's learned to build portable clay overs which are stored In high places away from the floods and they grow and preserve vegetables in the dry season to use when the floods come. They also have started building homes above the flood levels which means they don't have to keep moving.

If Sahena can take action, why can't politicians???

These are just my thoughts and you're getting more people to be on your side all the time, so you're doing stuff right.

I hope you keep on fighting for our world and for the future generations.
