Dear Parents

Thank you so much for all your patience and support as we have 'honed' our end of day arrangements and managed to incorporate swimming and some co-curricular activities into our weekly schedules. I almost daren't say it but I feel things are settling down and that the systems in place are working much more smoothly day by day and it is lovely to see the children learning confidently in their new year groups.

Whilst most people are doing their best to stick to the rules, I have had a number of concerns raised by parents about lack of social distancing at the beginning and end of the school day. I ask you to be mindful that those around you might fall into vulnerable categories, or might be living with those who do. It is important that we do our bit to protect everyone. Please therefore ensure that you remain 2m apart from other parents at drop off and pick up and please wear a face covering if you can. In addition, please make sure that your children are not running around between groups of parents and entering their family space.

It is just fantastic to have all the children back in school with us and we really want to keep our school open for everyone. We therefore need to do everything we can to ensure that our staff are protected too. Whilst we have always operated an 'open door' policy and try to make ourselves available to talk to parents when we can, clearly this is not as easy in the current climate. I ask you please, if you need to speak to your child's class teacher, to send an email to the school at **teachers@esherchurchschool.org.uk**. Emails to this address will be picked up directly by the teaching team, avoiding the need to pass them via the office. Please note that all teachers have access to emails sent to this address and it will not be checked after 5:30pm on school days nor over the weekend. Teachers will endeavour to provide a response within 2 working days.

We appreciate that on occasion parents may need a very quick word with their child's teacher if they are out at drop off or pick up times. If this is the case please make sure that you remain a minimum 2m distance away from members of staff in order to protect yourself and the member of staff. Some of our staff are choosing to wear visors during drop off and pick up times to protect themselves further as some parents are not sticking to the social distancing requirements. Thank you for your understanding.

Our Vision:

We have also received many queries around what to do if your child is unwell. This is clearly a difficult one as, particularly at this time of year, it is difficult to distinguish between symptoms of a cold and those of Covid-19. I have attached a 'What to do if' summary to this newsletter which contains the government advice on the actions to take in different scenarios which I hope you find helpful. If you are in any doubt at all about your child's health please err on the side of caution and keep them at home. Many schools are having to close multiple classes because infected children have been in school and we really don't want that to happen here. We are grateful for your co-operation in this regard.

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Free School Meal Eligibility

If you think you might be entitled to free school meals please get in touch with our office staff urgently. We can check your eligibility quickly with just your name and National Insurance Number.

You may be eligible for free school meals if you are now eligible for any of the following:

- Income Support
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- the guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get).

During the outbreak the government are also temporarily extending free school meal eligibility to include some groups (subject to household income) that have no recourse to public funds, including:

- children of Zambrano carers
- children of families with no recourse to public funds with a right to remain in the UK on grounds of private and family life under Article 8 of the European Convention on Human Rights
- children of families receiving support under Section 17 of the Children Act 1989 **who are also** subject to a no recourse to public funds restriction
- children of a subset of failed asylum seekers supported under Section 4 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.

If you think you might be eligible for free school meals please contact the school immediately. It is easy for us to check and it means that the school will receive additional funding to further support your child's education which can be used to support extra curricular activities, trips etc too.
