
Word of the Day:



- 1. A narrative (story) about what happens to the jaguar before he arrives in the boy's kitchen and the despair and pain he feels at seeing his home destroyed.
- 2. A diary entry from the perspective of the jaguar or the boy detailing the events in the video.
- **3.** A newspaper report explaining the plight of the jaguar/other animals in the rainforest and the destruction of their habitats.

<u>For today, we would like you to plan and start writing</u>. If possible, please <u>hand write your work</u> so you can keep up with your handwriting (particularly if you know that you need to focus on joining, letter formation, size of finger spaces and size of letters). <u>You will have tomorrow to finish writing and</u> <u>Friday to edit and publish your work</u>.

Remember to:

- Use the pictures in the video to help you describe the setting and the characters (but not all in one clump, spread it out!)
- Include the features of a newspaper report, if you are doing one! (for example: pictures, quotes, 5 W's, facts)
- Include the features of a diary entry, if you are doing one! (for example: past tense, first person, emotions, thoughts, opinions)
- Use the sentence spider for a variety of sentence openers (see sentence spider word mat in supporting documents)
- Use subordinate clauses in a variety of places, remember that subordinate clauses use subordinating conjunctions. (see word mat of subordinating conjunctions in supporting documents)
- SPEECH PUNCTUATION! (new speaker new line, alternatives for said, commas, opening and closing speech marks) and use speech to move the story along, don't get carried away! (We DO NOT want to see an entire page of speech all in one go!)
- Use fronted adverbials (remember the comma!)
- Neat, joined up handwriting

Reading:

For today we would like you to read a book of your choice for 40 minutes. You can choose to do this in two twenty minute sessions or one longer session of 40 minutes. **At least 15 minutes of reading must be aloud,** focusing on expression, fluency and acknowledgement of punctuation. You don't need to read to a person (although you can!) you could read to your teddy, pet or just to yourself. Of course, you can always read for longer if you wish!

L.I: To understand that Hinduism is a living faith

This half term our RE topic is Hinduism. It is a lovely cross over with our Big Enquiry learning so..... What do you already know about Hinduism?

See if you can answer any of the following questions:

Where did Hinduism start? How long ago did Hinduism start? How many Hindus are there worldwide? How many Hindus live in Britain? You may need to google some of these!

Many Hindus believe that there is one God who is worshipped in many different forms; the supreme one being Brahman. The deities (Gods) of Hinduism represent different characteristics of Brahman, the Supreme soul or spirit. Brahman is all around, in everything, all the time.

The three main deities are Brahma the Creator, Vishnu the protector, and Shiva the destroyer. These three are considered the **Trimurti** – the three aspects of the universal supreme God. This is a little bit like how Christians believe in the Trinity (God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit).


