English News



Year 4 have worked brilliantly this week to create their

very own stories written in the style of Oscar Wilde's, The Selfish Giant. I'm sure you'll agree they've done a fantastic job! They even read each other's stories and wrote book reviews for them.

Year 6 have been learning about how different coastal features are formed. This lovely piece of writing by Sarah explains how.

Mastering Maths and Computing

In Reception we have been learning about halving starting with objects and then moving onto numbers.

The children have been working together to make sure that they can share the cubes fairly so that they have half each. We have also enjoyed trying to beat the clock by quickly saying what half of numbers to 10 and 20 are

before the time runs out.





Year 1 have been learning about Capacity. *The big question of the week is: Is a cup half full or half empty?* They have been using mathematical language to describe the amount of water in containers eg half full, nearly full, empty etc. They counted how many pots make 1 litre as well as looking at which containers contain more or less liquid.

Year 4 have been practising their maths skills this week. They have been multiplying and dividing decimals by 10,100 and 1000 and it has been a challenge to complete ALL the questions. We have learnt not to 'just' add a zero on the end or 'just' move the decimal. The place value

chart has been crucial for us in developing our next maths step.

New Way of Reading

Throughout the school, the children have been learning to read through a new approach: *whole-class, choral reading.* They have been brilliant and the teachers are loving it!

We begin with a new text extract (so far, The Treasure Seekers in Year 3, The Lost World in Year 6 to name just a couple of examples) and we follow the same sequence through a series of lessons.

We begin with the teacher doing a 'model read' of the whole text, followed by a 'choral read' which involves the whole class reading at once.

Next read is 'jump-in', where the teacher starts and then gives a signal for the class to 'jump-in 'and continue reading.

The next read (pick-up) is quite similar but this time involves individual readers 'picking-up' from the teacher when a signal is given.

The following lessons are devoted to a close study of vocabulary, retrieval of information and making inferences about the text.

The sequence of lessons ends with a set of 'Big Questions' for the children to write their answers. Ask your child about it if you would like to know some more.

This Week in RE



This week the Reception children have been looking at the Parable of 'The Prodigal Son' and forgiveness. They then created their own hug from God to remember that he will forgive us. The children worked on their fine motor skills by drawing around their own hands and then carefully cutting them out.

Year 4 have been learning about the importance of the Guru Granth Sahib Ji for Sikhs.

They have been studying the language Gurmukhi and wrote the days of the week in the Guru's language. They enjoyed studying quotes from the Guru and interpreting them in their own way. They found out that the Guru Granth Sahib Ji is treated as a person and respected in many ways.



Year 5 continued to look at how Jesus taught us to live our lives through the Sermon on the Mount, focusing on worry. They considered what worry is and looked at how Jesus said "Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And which of you by being anxious can add a single hour to his span of life?" Once we discussed some of the things we worry about we learnt that things always work themselves out in the end and that often we worry less if we have faith in God - that he will watch over us and support us through it.

Science Update

Year 2 set up an experiment to find out what plants need to germinate. They made predictions about what will

happen to the plants in the different conditions they were put in and are going to observe them over the next few weeks.

They learnt about common flowers and discussed how many gardeners are trying to encourage a variety of wild flowers for the wildlife.

Year 3 have been investigating the question 'How does water get transported in plants?' They used celery and food dye and placed the celery in three different locations.
